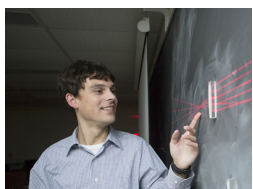
Diane Bates, PhD

Dr. Bates earned her PhD in Sociology from Rutgers University. She has primary research interests in environmental sociology with dual research projects centered on development in Latin America and in New Jersey. Research work with TCNJ students has focused on local environmental issues, including how the State's communities and organizations are recovering from SuperStorm Sandy.



Robert McGreevey, PhD

Robert McGreevey earned his PhD in History from Brandeis University. A specialist in the political, social, and cultural history of the United States from 1877-1945, his research focuses on the intersection of foreign policy and migration in the twentieth century. His research is supported by the Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations, the Immigration and Ethnic History Society, and the Organization of American Historians.

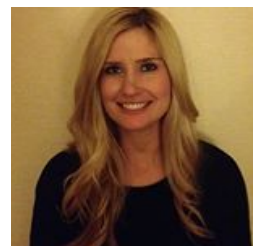
Nicholas Ratamess, PhD

Bonner Programs for Rising 10–12 Grade Students

The Bonner Center at TCNJ focuses on community engaged learning. Summer pre-college students will live on campus, have the option to earn four college credits, meet like-minded students, work with TCNJ faculty, and build their service portfolios for graduation requirements and college applications.

College Readiness and Community Service

- A one-week residential non-credit course through which high school students will have the opportunity to learn about the college application process, begin writing an application essay, participate in service learning, and live on a college campus
- June 24–June 29, 2018

Bonner Summer Fellows

- A two-week residential session that gives students an opportunity to earn college credit and participate in service learning by choosing one of three rigorous and stimulating TCNJ courses. Course offerings include 20th Century U.S. History, Introduction to Sociology, and Garden State.
- July 8–July 20, 2018

Bonner programs include:

- Fee for a non-credit course (1 week readiness program) or tuition for a four-credit course (1 TCNJ course unit) (Bonner 2-week program)
- Room and board
- A mentored service experience
- Recreational activities
- All transportation to and from service and recreational activities
- A workshop with admissions staff about highlighting community service and pre-college experiences during the college admissions process
